President's Corner



Movement that the rights of African Americans were fully recognized. Along with others, Abraham Lincoln and Martin Luther King Ir are true American citizens for their persistence in creating equality in America. Without this amendment and the Civil Rights Movement, I wouldn't have gotten to know Scott at football camp. Scott is African-American. We roomed together and talked about what our race means to us. He told me how important in was to him to be able to vote, to have the same rights as everyone else, and to be able to feel safe and not subject to racial discrimination. Because African-Americans are no longer denied their rights, Scott and I played side by side in our last football season. We now call each other friends.

The Nineteenth Amendment gave women the right of suffrage. We are all created equal and deserve the same rights. Even though I wasn't of age to vote this past November, because of this amendment, my mother was able to vote. I'm sure that the right to vote is just as important to women as it is to men. Because of the respect we have for women in our society, we have gained doctors, senators, and great American citizens.

The Twenty-Fourth Amendment was the last step to all American citizens receiving full voting rights. It lifted the poll tax, which restricted the less fortunate from exercising their right of suffrage. Voting is a very important part of being an American citizen. It allows the American people to voice their opinion on whom they believe is the right citizen to be our Commander in Chief.

The Twenty-First Amendment gave the states the right to set their own drinking age. I believe this amendment showed the government's trust in each state's laws and each state's citizens to
