Enjoy Memorable Tours at St. Louis Reunion

With three days of tour options at your Association's annual reunion, we're certain you'll find something fun to do.

Our Military Heritage

The October 6 tour takes you to the Soldiers' Memorial Military Museum, the Jefferson Barracks Historic Park and a guided tour of the Jefferson Barracks Museum.

The Memorial Museum contains photos and memorabilia dedicated to the 1,075 St. Louisans who died in action in World War 1. The last stop of this 5-hour review of military history is the Jeffer-

son Barracks National Cemetery, the fourth largest cemetery in the nation. More than 100,000 veterans and dependents, including Union and Confederate soldiers, are buried here.

Landmarks of St. Louis

The October 7 tour runs from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and includes stops at the Old Cathedral, Old Courthouse, Busch Stadium, the Riverfront, a tram ride at the Gateway Arch and a full brewery tour at the Anheuser-Busch Brewery.

The highlights from this tour come one after the other, including a tram ride to the top of the fa-

mous Gateway Arch for a magnificent view of St. Louis and the Mississippi River, to the famous 'King of Beers' brewery situated on more than 100 acres with 70 red brick structures featuring unique architecture, with many buildings designated as National Historic Landmarks.

Slots & Shops

Tour #3 takes you to St. Charles, the oldest town on the Missouri River. Your guided tour will include a driving tour of Main Street, a nine-block historic district with build-

Honor Flights Honor Our WWII Veterans

Hi, All. Returned Sunday from Washington, DC, serving as an Honor Flight guard-

ian, accompanying two WWII veterans to see the WWII memorial.

It was quite a moving and enjoyable experience for both of them, and me as well. If you

ever have the opportunity to make this trip, don't miss it. If you know any WWII vets, encourage them to consider the trip. There are two options: "The Honor Flight" which is totally free to the vet (guardians pay a small fee). This program flies out of

different "hubs" around the country when funds are available. The Chicago hub has a one year wait and more. We went on the Lone Eagle/Solo program where you pick a weekend that they offer the plan,

fund your own way to DC and tour with Honor Flight from there. East of the Mississippi is a one-day out, tour, return; that makes for a

LOOONG day for the vets. Lone Eagle is one, two or three days; your choice. Again, everything in DC is free for the vet but the guardian pays a per-day fee.

This is a great program and I cannot say enough kind things about Southwest Airlines, Hilton hotel Baltimore or even the TSA at the airports for the kindness and respect that was shown to our veterans.

first security type I could find and told him I needed to see the Command Master Chief of the Chafee. He got on his radio and called another security type and we were escorted to a building on the pier. There we were

turned us over to a fully armed Petty Officer, MAA rating. He called the ship and within minutes a LTGJ met us and escorted the wife and me up the gangway.

We were met on the quarter deck by the XO. After I told him what my mission was, he hailed CMC Paul King to the quarter where we exchanged pleasantries. On my request, he escorted us to the "Goat Locker" for a good cup of Navy Chiefs Mess coffee. Oh how good it tasted! It
