Dear Shipmates,

I don't intend to have this be a morbid letter to you, but I would like to take a little time to tell you some of my experiences with burials at sea. This is a long and honored naval ceremony and is a fitting burial for those who spent much of their time at sea. The Navy goes "all out" in providing this service and it is a dignified and respectful farewell to our shipmates.

My first such burial took place onboard USS Jouett (CG-29) in 1974. As we were preparing for our WEST-PAC deployment, I got a call from the local Naval Hospital tasking us with the burial. As we would be stopping in Pearl Harbor for a

few days, the deceased's family requested he be buried just offshore from Diamond Head. Being Hawaii, the weather was perfect, and the burial went very well.

I was honored to conduct two such burials onboard the Ageless Warrior. We gathered on the port aircraft elevator and our Marine Detachment provided the rifle volleys. These two burials were also done with solemnity and dignity.

In each case, the ship's CO wrote a letter of condolence to the family and included a chart showing the ship's location at the time of the service.

In my subsequent civilian ministry as a pastor, I have conducted many funerals and burials, all of

which were very moving and meaningful, but I would have to say that the three burials at sea were the most unique. I am honored to have had that privilege.

Speaking of which, Shipmates, we are all facing "that day". Hopefully you and I have made at least some preliminary plans. Over and over, I have witnessed a sort of peace when the next -of-kin has somewhat detailed information their loved one left behind. It is a difficult time, but it is made just a bit easier knowing the last wishes of our loved ones.

countries without sending one troop anywhere. NATO is a great example of this. Most members of NATO do not have strong militaries, but given the fact that America does, Russia does not even dare to interfere with any member. It is important that America maintains a strong armed force so we can keep order in the world.

There are many other benefits to keeping a strong military. When talking in terms of alliances, having a powerful armed force will make it more likely for other countries to side with America. Many countries have seen the benefits of siding with the United States, and it has proven beneficial to both parties involved, not only regarding military power, but with economics as well. If America did not uphold its strong armed force, there would not be much reason for countries across the world to make alliances as they do now. South Korea, for example, has been a strong ally for the United States and has fought alongside us in Afghanistan and in Vietnam. They recognize American military power and are more inclined to support our goal of maintaining international peace. This is another reason why America should keep a strong armed force.

An obvious reason why the United States should maintain a strong military is the benefit of power in warfare.
